



## Part II - Testimony

On the morning of 17 January 1968, the author was driving along the highway between Saigon and Phuoc Long, Vietnam. At approximately 0700 hours, he observed a large column of smoke rising from the ground near the highway. The smoke was very dense and billowing, and appeared to be coming from a point about one-half mile to the west of the highway.

Upon closer examination, it was determined that the smoke was coming from a large fire at the site of a former American military installation.
